





Training the Next Generation

The Valley Children's Pediatric Residency Program, Affiliated with Stanford University School of Medicine, will prepare the next generation of pediatricians and pediatric medical and surgical specialists like you to continue delivering the best medical care to children and families. Our new, innovative, interprofessional program provides a comprehensive education that includes both general and advanced clinical pediatric training.

At Valley Children's Hospital, you will learn and practice in one of the country's largest children's hospitals. Our 358-bed, state-of-the-art facility offers specialized medical and surgical services to treat conditions ranging from common to the most unusual and complex. Valley Children's Hospital is Central California's only designated Level II Pediatric Trauma Center and has been ranked by U.S. News & World Report as one of the nation's best children's hospitals in several service lines over the years. Residents will also rotate through Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford. Both hospitals serve an economically and ethnically diverse patient population from a referral area encompassing Central California and the San Francisco Bay Area.

We know residency is an exciting and challenging time, and we are committed to supporting you through your journey. From the day you interview to graduation and beyond, we are devoted to helping you achieve your personal and professional goals.

The mission of Valley Children's Pediatric Residency Program is to train physician leaders and scholars who will provide compassionate and collaborative interprofessional care as general or subspecialist pediatricians whether practicing in academic, public health or community practice settings.

Diversity, Advocacy, Disparity and Service

The Central Valley is home to nearly 4 million people. The area is culturally diverse, with more than 70 ethnicities and 105 languages represented. The 2010 U.S. Census anticipates the Central Valley population will reach nearly 6 million by 2030. Valley Children's 12-county service area serves approximately 1.4 million children. The Valley's most vulnerable residents, its children, struggle with some of the nation's lowest education rates, highest poverty levels and obesity rates, poorest air quality and very limited access to both primary and subspecialty care.

Valley Children's is committed to training compassionate physicians who seek to advocate for underserved children. Our residents are immersed in the community, cultural humility and responsibility and advocacy training that starts early in their education. All of this is woven throughout the three-year curriculum.

Advocacy: Advocacy is a challenging yet rewarding aspect of medicine. Valley Children's is committed to training compassionate physicians who seek to advocate for underserved children, many of whom reside in Central California. Our residents have the opportunity to gain individualized experience with community experts in a variety of settings that include but are not limited to, schools, mobile medical units, juvenile detention centers, homeless shelters, and rural and urban underserved clinics.





Curriculum



Didactics: Our structured, 18-month curriculum presented by our outstanding faculty features interactive lectures and workshops. In addition to pediatric content-based sessions, we offer a broad, interprofessional selection of topics such as palliative care, evidence-based medicine, cultural competency, simulation, ethics, professional development, advocacy, resident wellness and scholarly activity.

Scholarship: Areas of concentration (tracks) are designed to allow residents to focus their elective time and scholarly activity in areas that supplement their personal and career goals. Each resident is paired with a mentor to meet with regularly throughout the year for direction and guidance relevant to the area of concentration. We offer a number of electives and experiences that residents can tailor to fit their needs and interests, ensuring an individualized, longitudinal experience.

Primary Care Plus - The goal of this track is to train physicians to become proficient in community outreach, needs assessment, process implementation, and evaluation resulting in systems or policy change affecting the community. Residents will be expected to develop strong community partnerships culminating in collaborations to meet community identified needs. Residents will demonstrate excellence in community-based qualitative, quantitative and/or educational scholarship and disseminate findings on a local and/or national level. Activities include but are not limited to: group lecture or workshop focused on principles of community-based participatory research, community outreach, and process implementation; online advocacy modules through the California AAP chapter; participation in Community Medicine and Advocacy Stakeholders committee; membership in the California chapter of the AAP.

Hospital Medicine and Quality Improvement (QI) & Patient Safety - The goal of this track is to train physicians to become stewards of safe, high quality and patient centered care with a focus on the inpatient setting. Residents in this concentration will learn to identify and apply current evidence to optimize care across healthcare systems including the transition from inpatient to outpatient care. They will practice incorporating consideration of cost and risk-benefit analysis specific to inpatient medical care. Residents will be expected to demonstrate strong written and oral communications skills through dissemination of a scholarly product in local, regional and/or national forums. Activities include but are not limited to: group lecture or workshop focused on key principles of QI; online QI modules; participation in hospital Patient Safety and/or Quality Improvement committees; membership in the Section on Hospital Medicine of the AAP.

Academic Medicine & Leadership - The goal of this track is to train physicians to become skilled clinician-academics and educators who will serve as leaders in a healthcare system. Residents will be expected to become proficient in applying essential principles of curriculum design, learner assessment, and educational program evaluation. They will develop leadership skills under the guidance of a senior mentor that will allow them to successfully lead a functional and productive team on any level. Activities include but are not limited to: group lecture or workshop focused on nationally acclaimed leadership tenets; online advanced faculty development modules; maintain an Educator's portfolio; membership in the Academic Pediatric Association.

Pediatric Subspecialties - The goal of this track is to train physicians to become well versed in the language of scholarship and research methods and to apply this knowledge to the development of individual and collaborative research projects in their chosen subspecialty of interest. Residents will be expected to recognize the importance of scholarly inquiry and development of a national reputation to promote the advancement of a subspecialty field. They will demonstrate an awareness of the unique aspects of care of a chosen subspecialty as it pertains to outpatient, inpatient, and procedural requirements. Activities include but are not limited to: group lecture or workshop focused on principles of critical appraisal and the practice of EBM; online modules on clinical research statistics; participation in a relevant committee as directed by the chosen subspecialty (e.g. Infection prevention subcommittee if interested in Infectious Disease); membership in the relevant national subspecialty organization.

Full research support, including in-depth Institutional Review Board (IRB) training, is provided for all residents. Our program offers a comprehensive curriculum to prepare residents to contribute to the field of pediatrics through a wide variety of scholarly endeavors.





The Valley Children's Experience

Interprofessionalism: We work as a team to provide the best care for patients, so it makes sense to train as an interprofessional team. Our holistic approach to education draws upon the expertise of all medical professionals, including physicians, nurses, social workers, pharmacists and other integral members of the healthcare team.

Innovation: Forward thinking from faculty, administration, staff and residents is vital to success. We are looking for fearless pioneers and resourceful innovators to help drive our program to the highest level.

Simulation: Simulation experiences form the cornerstone of the interprofessional education experience. Our simulation team provides training during all phases of resident education with emphasis on emergency management of clinical situations, interpersonal communication skills and mastering difficult conversations.

Family-Centered Care: Family-centered care helps drive patient satisfaction and improves work flow, team communication, interprofessional relations and patient safety. Benefits to residents include practicing communicating information to patients and families with varied educational and cultural backgrounds.



Clinical Sites

Valley Children's Hospital: Located at Valley Children's main campus in Madera, the Hospital offers the full spectrum of pediatric subspecialty medical and surgical care, and support services.

Lucile Packard Children's Hospital Stanford: Located in Palo Alto, California, the Hospital is the partner for your rotations in Developmental Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine.

Kaiser Permanente's Fresno Birthing Center: This site for the newborn nursery rotation, provides a comprehensive, family-centered birthing facility.

Charlie Mitchell Children's Center: Located on Valley Children's main campus in Madera, the Center provides primary care to medically complex children and their healthy siblings. The clinic is an option for both electives and continuity clinic.

Kaiser Permanente: Residents interested in the Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) model of primary care may choose a continuity clinic with our educational partner.

Valley Children's Primary Care Group: Residents interested in primary care and/or caring for a diverse population of children, including the underserved, may choose one of several surrounding community sites as their continuity clinic.



And our renowned Hospital has been recognized by U.S. News & World Report as one of the nation's best children's hospitals in several service lines over the years.




