# The History & Heart of the Juilds

Seventy-five years ago, five women came together with a shared vision: to create a hospital for children only. Their vision took shape through tireless fundraising, grassroots advocacy, and an unwavering belief in the power of community. In 1952, Valley Children's Hospital opened its doors as a 42-bed pediatric facility, a direct result of their dedication and the fundraising efforts of our original Guilds.

## Mission

To raise funds, advocate for children, and promote goodwill for Valley Children's Healthcare.

While the hospital has grown into a nationally respected 358-bed pediatric hospital and network serving over 1.3 million children across 13 counties, the heart of the Guilds' mission remains unchanged. Today, the Guilds are Valley Children's largest financial contributors, having raised over \$35 million to ensure that every child receives the best care possible, regardless of their family's ability to pay.

With creativity, compassion, and a steadfast commitment to children's health, the Guilds continue the legacy of their founding mothers—transforming a vision into reality for 75 years and counting.

## How the Guilds Make a Difference

The Guilds' fundraising success is built on partnership and purpose.

- Guild leadership meets with Valley Children's CEO to identify endowments needed, which are voted on by the Guilds.
- All funds raised by the Guilds are allocated to that specific endowment through restricted giving.
- Once the endowment is fulfilled, interest ensures continued support year after year, providing long-lasting impact.

September 1963

Then and there it was decided to have a children's hospital.

... Visits were being made to groups up and down the valley, with two purposes:

1. To explain the idea of a Valley Children's Hospital, and seek moral and financial support.

2. To form local guilds, to raise funds to maintain the hospital and promote good will maintain the hospital in their own communities.

These visits were made by several of the young mothers, with the advice and consent of the Moving Board, which had been formed to guide the whole project.

# Continuing a Legacy of Impact

For 75 years, the Guilds have been dedicated to ensuring that Valley Children's remains a pillar of health and hope for families throughout the Central Valley. Through visionary fundraising and steadfast stewardship, the Guilds have established five significant endowments totaling \$14 million, with cumulative distributions surpassing \$5 million to date. In FY2024 alone, these endowments distributed \$823,501, funding critical programs that serve patients, families, and staff.

## Toyota Tundra Giveaway: An All Guild Fundraiser

The Toyota Tundra Giveaway is an annual fundraiser where all 13 Guilds unite, partnering with Central Valley
Toyota Dealers, International Agri-Center, and World Ag Expo to support Valley

Children's. Since its inception in 2015, this collaborative effort centers

around raffling a brand-new, generously donated Toyota Tundra,
ensuring that every single dollar raised through raffle ticket sales
directly benefits Valley Children's. Ticket sales take place over
several months—from September through February—
culminating at the three-day World Ag Expo in Tulare.

The excitement peaks on the Expo's final day when the

winning ticket is drawn and announced.

Over the past 10 years, the Toyota Tundra
Giveaway has surpassed an incredible milestone:
more than \$725,000 raised for Valley
Children's—an incredible accomplishment that
the Guilds can celebrate together.

Today, through strategic investments in endowments, we are ensuring that the hospital's vital programs and services will endure and adapt for generations to come.



## Making a Difference for Future Generations

The Guilds Center for Community Health is a strong example of our commitment to lasting strategic impact. With the funding of a \$5 million endowment, the Guilds are supporting efforts to create healthier communities and improve the lives of children where they live, learn, and play, well into the future. By addressing factors like food security, literacy, mental health, and safe sleep, the Guilds Center for Community Health ensures that children across the Central Valley have the resources and support they need to thrive.

## Continuing a Legacy of Advocacy

Another cornerstone of the Guilds' work is the Guilds Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Center. Established through a \$5 million endowment, this program has transformed how Valley Children's addresses child maltreatment. The Guilds Center provides comprehensive care for children experiencing abuse, including head-to-toe medical evaluations and ongoing collaboration with law enforcement and child welfare agencies. Before the Guilds' support, the Center didn't exist. Today, it is recognized as a leader in advocacy, injury prevention, and training.

The Pink Pig Fund, established at a Guild luau nearly 75 years ago, represents the enduring spirit of community and care that defines who we are as Guilds. ## Tangible Support, Big Impact



# Protecting the Vulnerable With Healing & Tope

In 2007, the Guilds of Valley Children's made a historic commitment that would forever change the landscape of care for children in the Central Valley. Recognizing a critical gap in services for children experiencing abuse, the Guilds established the Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Endowment—a \$5 million fund dedicated to creating a multidisciplinary program to address one of the most heart-wrenching challenges faced by children and families. The result was the Guilds Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Center (GCATC), a guiding light of hope and healing for the most vulnerable in our community.

## Giving a Voice to the Voiceless

Before the Guilds' intervention, resources to address child abuse in our 13-county region were sparse. The hospital's efforts consisted of a single, part-time physician who worked on-call to review suspected abuse cases—an overwhelming responsibility, especially as case numbers rose year after year. By 2007, the number of suspected cases under review had increased by 33%, reaching 300 annually. It was clear that more needed to be done.

The Guilds answered this need with characteristic determination and vision. A \$5 million endowment laid the foundation for the establishment of a comprehensive center that could meet the growing demand for services.

Today, the GCATC is a multidisciplinary, kid-friendly program led by Dr. Wan-Keung Chen. The team now includes four specially trained physicians, licensed clinical and forensic staff, mental health professionals, and support personnel, who all work side-by-side to ensure that every child receives the care they need.

The GCATC's approach goes beyond addressing physical injuries. It focuses on holistic, traumainformed care that addresses the emotional and psychological toll of abuse, creating a pathway to healing and resilience for children and their families. From comprehensive medical evaluations to mental health support, the GCATC's services have become an irreplaceable resource for our community.





## Collaborative Advocacy

The GCATC doesn't work alone—collaboration is at the heart of its mission. The GCATC works closely with law enforcement, Child Protective Services, and district attorney's offices to provide expert consultation, support investigations, and advocate for the health and safety of at-risk children.

Established in 2000 and facilitated by the GCATC, monthly Suspected Child Abuse and Neglect (SCAN) meetings bring together these key stakeholders to track cases, monitor progress, and ensure accountability. This partnership-based approach has established the GCATC as a leader in advocacy, injury prevention, and education, both within the Central Valley and across the entire state.

## A Future of Healing

The GCATC is a shining example of what our community can achieve together—a legacy of protection and advocacy that will endure for generations to come. This vital program stands as a testament to our founding mothers' vision of ensuring that every child has the opportunity to grow up healthy, safe, and supported.

The GCATC's success is also a reflection of the incredible staff who bring the vision to life. Their unwavering dedication to children and families means they provide care that goes above and beyond, transforming lives and creating a ripple effect of hope across the community. As the Guilds celebrate 75 years of service, we reaffirm our commitment to the Center and to the children it serves. Together, we will ensure that every child has a voice, a champion, and a safe place to heal.

This endowment represents more than financial support. It's a symbol of the Guilds' unwavering commitment to the well-being of our children. Every child who comes through our doors is treated with the utmost care, respect, and compassion, and that is only possible because of their vision.

## Building Healthier Communities Reyond Hospital Walls

Valley Children's has always believed that the health of the children in our community is shaped not just by the medical care they receive, but by the environments in which they live, learn, and play. This guiding principle inspired the creation of the Guilds Center for Community Health, a groundbreaking initiative aimed at addressing the factors that affect children's health far beyond clinical care.

## A Vision Rooted in Community

The Guilds Center for Community Health was established to address the 80% of health outcomes impacted by social determinants such as access to nutritious food, safe housing, and educational opportunities. From its inception, the Guilds Center has worked to bridge the gap between clinical care and these broader influences, ensuring that children receive comprehensive support that

nurtures their overall well-being. This approach has been transformative, especially in the Central Valley, where economic and environmental challenges often amplify disparities in health outcomes.

## A Closer Look at Programs Making a Difference

The Guilds Center for Community Health has spearheaded several impactful programs, each addressing critical needs within our community.

## **♥ PROMOTING SAFER SLEEP**

Recognizing that the Valley has some of the highest rates of infant mortality due to unsafe sleep practices, the Guilds Center led the establishment of a nine-county collaborative program called the Safe Sleep Initiative to address the issues of safe sleep in our communities. Through community education and screening, the Guilds Center has worked with partner organizations like the Fresno Hope Hub to provide resources such as infant swaddle blankets, pack-and-plays, and safe sleep education.



## **FOCUSING ON FOOD SECURITY**

The Central Valley produces approximately one-quarter of the nation's table foods, yet one in four children in the area faces hunger. In response to this pervasive challenge, the Guilds Center, in a long-standing partnership with the Central California Food Bank, launched three pilot programs to better meet the food needs of our Valley's children and families. A home food delivery program, working with our own Home Health team, reached families with medically complex kids to ensure that the family's basic food needs were met. A school food pantry and support for Fresh Fruits Market, a market startup led by the Fresno Rescue Mission, provided two other ways to ensure that more children had a chance for healthy food every day. Our partnerships with Tulare FoodLink, as well as the Merced County Food Bank, have allowed us to work on issues around food insecurity in schools and across those communities.

## ♥ ADDRESSING ADVERSE CHILDHOOD EXPERIENCES (ACES)

One of the Guilds Center's most significant areas of focus is the impact of ACEs. Research shows that children who endure high levels of ACEs are more likely to face chronic health issues as adults. To combat this, the Guilds Center collaborates with partners like ACE Overcomers and the Merced County Office of Education to provide parenting classes, educational modules for teachers, and support for foster youth. By addressing these challenges early, the Guilds Center helps set the stage for healthier, more resilient futures.

## **PREVENTING YOUTH SUICIDE**

The Guilds Center led the organization's participation in a national collaborative effort with 15 other children's hospitals to focus on the goal of having zero suicides among the kids we care for and the kids in our communities. Through this national work group, we improved our own screening and safety planning, identified new promising practices to implement, and strengthened our community partnerships with schools and others working on this shared goal.

## Generational Commitment to Healthier Children

Health inequities cannot be solved overnight, but by fostering long-term programs and partnerships, the Guilds Center is laying the groundwork for sustainable, generational change. These efforts reflect the Guilds' longstanding philosophy: real impact happens when communities come together.

The Guilds Center represents a new frontier in pediatric care—one that acknowledges the complex, interconnected factors that shape health. As we look toward the future, the Guilds Center will continue to expand its reach, guided by the voices of the community and informed by ongoing research. We remain committed to supporting the Guilds Center's work and ensuring that every child has the tools and opportunities they need to lead a healthy life.

## Securing the Future of Valley Children's

For 75 years, the Guilds of Valley Children's have remained steadfast in their mission to support the health and well-being of children across the Central Valley. As we continue to look to the future, we are honored to announce our next commitment: two transformative endowments totaling \$12 million that will expand lifesaving care and provide support for generations to come.

## Guilds ECMO Endowment: \$10 Million

At the forefront of this commitment is the Guilds Extracorporeal Membrane Oxygenation (ECMO) Endowment—a \$10 million investment to grow and enhance Valley Children's ECMO Program, the only one of its kind in the Central Valley. ECMO provides advanced heart and lung support to critically ill infants and children, giving them a chance to heal when conventional treatments are no longer enough. The Guilds' support will allow Valley Children's to:

- Expand capacity to care for more than two ECMO patients at a time
- Invest in specialized training and advanced simulation technology
- Enhance follow-up care and support for ECMO patients and their families

Valley Children's ECMO program is one of only 16 centers worldwide to be recognized as a Designated Platinum Center of Excellence by the Extracorporeal Life Support Organization (ELSO). This prestigious designation reflects the program's exceptional commitment to evidence-based processes, staff training, patient satisfaction, and clinical care. The Guilds' investment will expand this world-class care, ensuring that more children have access to lifesaving treatment when they need it most.

## Guilds of Valley Children's Healthcare Endowment: \$2 Million

While the Guilds' established endowments continue to support the Guilds Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Center, Child Life, Spiritual Care, Willson Heart Center, and Guilds Center for Community Health, this \$2 million endowment will provide something unique: flexibility and reach. Once fully funded, this endowment will create a grant application process to directly support different areas of Valley Children's network, empowering staff to:

- Launch new initiatives that benefit children and families
- Enhance existing programs and fulfill immediate needs
- Foster innovation and strengthen care across the Valley Children's network

This forward-looking approach ensures that the Guilds' impact adapts alongside the hospital's evolving priorities, supporting both groundbreaking advancements and the everyday needs of staff, patients, and families.

These two new endowments mark the next chapter in the Guilds' remarkable legacy. With their vision, creativity, and unwavering dedication, the Guilds continue to propel Valley Children's forward—ensuring that no matter what the future holds, our region's children will always have access to the best care possible.


## Board of Trustees Guild Representative Position
